Rebuilding Notre Dame: Gothic Architecture in Action

with Will Gusakov—Master Timber Framer, Founder of Goosewing Timberworks
Friday, March 6, 1:30–3pm

Join timber framer Will Gusakov for an inside look at the extraordinary effort to rebuild the nave roof of Notre Dame de Paris. Drawing on six months of hands-on work in France, Will shares stunning images, videos, and stories from both the Normandy workshop and the cathedral site. Learn about the artistry, craftsmanship, and collaboration behind restoring one of the world’s most iconic gothic and neo-gothic architectural masterpieces.

The Crown Point Road: Vermont’s First Interstate

with Barry Griffith, Hiker and History Buff
Friday, March 13, 1:30–3pm

Discover the story of the Crown Point Road, first marked and cut by the British in 1759 and sometimes called “Vermont’s first interstate highway.” Trace its use as a military road from the Connecticut River to Lake Champlain during the French and Indian War and again in the American Revolution. Follow Vermont’s earliest settlers from southern New England as they built homes and communities along the route. Explore the geology, history, and lasting significance of the road over the last 12,000 years to present day, with a special focus on Rutland County.

Varied & Alive: Treasures from Shelburne Museum’s Permanent Collection

Ever wonder what kinds of art and objects are hidden in Shelburne Museum’s storage areas? Join curator Katie Wood Kirchhoff for an inside look at Varied & Alive, an exhibition opening in May 2026 at the Pizzagalli Center for Art and Education. Explore a fascinating mix of iconic paintings, furniture, trade signs, weathervanes, quilts, and more that bring the museum’s rarely seen collections to life.



“Who is James K. Polk?”

Killington, A Story of the American Dream

Experience an illustrated presentation of Killington Ski Area’s fascinating journey from humble beginnings to the “Beast of the East.” Trace the mountain’s formidable presence on the Vermont landscape from the first known ascent in 1763 to the modern resort era. Learn how a man with foresight and tenacity explored the mountain in 1955 and, in pursuit of his American Dream, attracted a talented team who helped Killington pioneer “a better way”—ultimately becoming one of the nation’s top destination resorts.

Henry Ford and the Car That Changed the World

with Ernie Clerihew, Model T Enthusiast and Restorer

Henry Ford (1863–1947) was born on a farm outside Detroit, but he hated the drudgery of farm work. Mechanically gifted, Henry was intrigued as a teen by the steam tractor. As a young man, he got a job in Detroit with the Edison Illuminating Company. In 1896 Ford built his first car and sought investors to establish The Ford Motor Company in 1903. Our presenter bought his 1914 Ford Model T in 1988 and has had many adventures with it. He will share the Model T’s history and its quirks, and invites you to tour the car afterward.
